This week I will offer up an indispensable website for ELA teachers, [Project Gutenberg](https://www.gutenberg.org/wiki/Main_Page) ([https://www.gutenberg.org/wiki/Main\\_Page](https://www.gutenberg.org/wiki/Main_Page)). This site houses the full online texts of over 50,000 titles available in the public domain. You can search by category, title or author. Most works are available in multiple formats to either read online or download to a Kindle, iPad etc...
